North Berwick in Bloom wins Gold and Coastal Category in Britain in Bloom for a second time.



It seemed a long time between judging on 7th August and the awards ceremony on 6 October but it was worth the wait as the town received high praise from the judges and was again awarded Gold and, jointly with Lytham, won the Coastal Category up to 12k population. Other finalists were Herm, (Guernsey), Grouville, (Jersey), Filey and Tenby.

receive the awards from Matt Baker, TV Presenter of the One Show, Countryfile etc

Kathryn Smith Secretary



AULD KIRK RESTORATION

In 2011 the Council, who are the owners of the Old St Andrew's Church in Kirk Ports, removed the timber framed Bell

Tower Roof because of its deteriorating condition and their safety concerns. Their initial intentions were to cap the headwalls and leave the ruin in a stable state. However, local opinion didn't agree with this proposal because of the loss of the iconic profile of the historic building.

The Kirk is the second parish church in the town and was built between 1658 and 1664 after the original church, near the site of the Seabird Centre, was largely washed into the sea during storms in the 1650's. It continued as the place of worship until it became too small for the needs of the growing town and a new church, the present St Andrew's Blackadder, was built in 1883. The kirk is an integral part of the history of the town and local families can be traced through the records and many are buried in the graveyard. Also buried there is John Blackadder the Presbyterian Covenanter preacher who died while imprisoned on the Bass Rock.

The concerns of the local community have been expressed at meetings between council members and officers, the Community Council , North Berwick Environment Trust and Historic Scotland. Ways of replacing the roof and making safe the remainder of the building have been examined and a decision made to employ a consultant to undertake a feasibility study to report on the issues and costs to replace the roof, make the tower structurally sound and arrest the deterioration to the remainder of the building. The possibility of opening the church up to more visitors with interpretation boards and direct access from the Lodge Grounds will also be considered.

The advice from the technical officials is that £10,000 would be required for a suitable study and the partners were able to contribute or apply for funding and £9000 has so far been raised from East Lothian Council, the Community Council, the Stella Moffat Trust and the Common Good Fund. Because of its charitable status the North Berwick Environment Trust is taking a lead in the project and will commission the study. The Chair, Val Harding has undertaken to consult with the community when the study is complete to ensure all views are considered before any further developments.

Visit of children from Chernobyl to North Berwick

The Rotary club of North Berwick has for several years been hosting children from Chernobyl, giving them a fun day out. This year the children came from a poor rural agricultural area of



Chernobyl. Their land is still badly contaminated with the radioactivity from the explosion of the nuclear plant in 1986. As a result of the radioactive pollution the children's immune system against cancer is very low and a high percentage of the young people will suffer from cancer of the Thyroid Gland. Research indicates that if the young people from Chernobyl can be given a holiday away from the pollution, on their return home their immune system is greatly boosted. Statistics show that for each week away in clean air with healthy food their life expectancy is extended by I year.

During their visit to North Berwick, they had a trip in the Braveheart, a shore ride on the inshore Lifeboat and a visit to the Seabird Centre. After a bonus visit to the aviaries in the Lodge Grounds, the children went to the Sports Centre for an hour on the Trampolines followed by a picnic at the Lodge grounds play area.
