ROTARY CLUB OF NORTH BERWICK

Richard Rogers took over as President of the North Berwick Rotary Club at the end of June. Richard is frequently asked “what exactly is Rotary”? so in this Newsletter we thought we should find out. Indeed, the Rotary Club here in North Berwick is hosting a Rotary Awareness Evening at the Marine Hotel, North Berwick, on the 17th November at 7.30 pm, to help do just this.

Richard says “Rotary is a group of like-minded people who want to put something back into their communities in and around North Berwick whilst also supporting needy projects abroad. It’s also about having some fun together whilst doing so”. Richard joined Rotary 4 years ago having returned to Scotland after working abroad. He says “I found it a great way to gain new friends and I’ve had a lot of fun along the way too”.

The Rotary organisation itself was formed in 1905 and has 1.2 million members across the world. The Club in North Berwick was formed in April 1967 so next year will see the Club’s 50th anniversary. Richard says “There are a lot of misconceptions about Rotary”. He has been asked whether it is a secret society like the Masons. He says “No! The only thing members keep secret are their trouser waist and dress sizes”! This brings us onto whether Rotary membership is just for men. Again, Richard says “No! There are female members in the Club and we would love to see more”. Ah yes, but isn’t Rotary just a club for the older generation? Richard says “members can be in their 20s to their 80s. In North Berwick the youngest members are in their 40s and the oldest in their 80s. This does not detract from the sense of fun we have together but I do recognise that the Club needs to attract younger members to survive in the longer term”. Of course, people are struggling for time these days especially if they are working. Richard says “Yes the Club does meet every week between 7 pm and 9 pm for a meal, friendship, to enjoy some humour, to hear a speaker or to update ourselves on what is happening in the Club. However, the Club appreciates that not everyone can attend each week. If someone can come along, say, twice a month and get involved in some of the outside activities, then they are likely to be just the sort of person who will make a great Rotarian”. Over the last few months the local club has been very busy. Richard explained “In July we organised the car parking at the Muirfield Riding Therapy Summer Show; in August we organised the car parking at the North Berwick Highland Games; in September we completed the refurbishment of seats near Elcho Green; in October we helped with the Dunbar Choral and North Berwick Sings Concert. Members have also enjoyed a group BBQ and have had a day out at the Royal Yacht Britannia. We have put to good use some of the monies we have raised to help individuals and groups in need locally whilst also funding two Shelter Boxes for families in disaster areas abroad. Two of our High School students have been funded and attended a Rotary Youth Leadership Award week which included giving presentations to their fellow students about what they got out of this as well as coming to talk to Rotarians. There are many other things we have been up to but we are running out of space!” Richard says “Come along on the 17th November to Rotary’s Awareness Evening. See if it something that you may like to become involved with or go away with a greater understanding of what Rotary in North Berwick is all about. COASTAL COMMUNITIES MUSEUM LATEST NEWS

2016 has been the most successful season to date with over 7,000 visitors coming to the museum to find out more about '*A History of the Coastal Communities in 99 OBJECTS*'. While the largest number of visitors have been one-off, more people than in previous years and in particular, residents have returned a second or third time to take-in the wide range of exhibits. After all, ninety nine exhibits is a lot to take in all at once! Towards the end of September we were fortunate enough to be favoured with a visit from the Rev. Dr Russell Barr, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, who was completing a modern pilgrim's walk from St. Mary's Church in Whitekirk to the site of the Old St. Andrews Kirk down by North Berwick harbour along with others. During his visit to the museum for a 'Pilgrim's Lunch' he was shown round the exhibition and took particular interest in the model and video of the Old St. Andrews Kirk. The presentation of this exhibit and accompanying video had been the culmination of a grand collaboration of various individual local people, North Berwick High School, St Baldred's Church Choir and Dunedin Arts, working in conjunction with the Museum. The Coastal Communities Museum is now open at weekends only, between 11am and 4pm until Sunday 27 November when it closes for a winter break.

NORTH BERWICK AIR CADETS (132 Sqn ATC)

Since its inception in 2008 as a detached flight of 297 (Musselburgh) Sqn, the North Berwick Air Cadet Unit has grown into a thriving squadron in its own right, under the leadership of the current Officer Commanding, Flt Lt Iain Edmans RAFVR(T). Every squadron has to have a Civilian Committee with responsibility for certain aspects of finances, accommodation and general wellbeing of the cadets. We are currently looking for new committee members. As ATC is first and foremost a youth organisation (and absolutely not a recruitment scheme for the RAF!), we are looking for new members who have an interest in youth development and community engagement. THE CRAWFORD & CALDER CUPS 2016

Around 60 competitors entered the North Berwick Community Council organised Crawford and Calder Cups. In a keenly contested final between brother and sister, Glen and Grace Crawford from North Berwick, Grace won the Crawford Cup for under 14's, beating her brother 5&3 and becoming the first girl to have her name on the Cup. Lyle Crawford, who had donated the Cup in 1994, presented the prizes. The final of the Calder Cup was contested by two former winners, Chris Low and David Warren, with Chris winning the closely contested final by 4&3. Competition Organiser and Community Council Secretary, Cllr Kathryn Smith presented the prizes and attributed the increase in entrants to the much improved state of the course and work done by East Lothian Council.

NEWS FROM THE SEABIRD CENTRE

It's now the height of seal season and there are wonderful views on the Centre's live cameras of the seal colonies and the new pups on Craigleith and the Isle of May. ***Please remember do not approach any pups on the beach and keep dogs clear.*** The pups are often not abandoned but waiting for the next high tide. If you think that an animal is injured, please contact the Seabird Centre or the SSPCA.

The Centre is currently hosting an excellent exhibition by the Firth Forth Lobster Hatchery. Over 1,000 volunteers have now worked on the Centre's SOS Puffin project to control tree mallow on Craigleith and Fidra increasing biodiversity on the islands and helping the local puffin populations. The Centre's Puffling Rescue Service ran again in the summer to rescue disorientated young puffins. The North Berwick Wildlife Clubs remain very popular with children of all ages. Details of these, as well as school visits, are available from the Centre's Education Officer, Andrew Grieseson.

The Centre is continuing to look at how it can achieve more of its objectives as a conservation and education charity. In addition to seabirds, it is keen to cover more of Scotland's amazing marine wildlife as well as important marine environment issues by creating a national marine centre (working title). To help identify how it can best achieve this, the Centre has been running a public survey to encourage views, comments, recommendations and ideas. Details at www.seabird.org

Original architects for the Centre (Simpson & Brown) have recently been appointed to consider all options and consult locally. With the necessary funding support, it is hoped that the marine centre will open by 2020, creating an important education and conservation facility for East Lothian as well as Scotland as a whole.

The second year of the Forth Ferry between North Berwick and Anstruther proved successful and it has now been confirmed that it will run again next summer – vouchers for this and the other boat trips are currently available at this year's prices. Nick Crane (BBC Coast) is talking at the Centre on 22nd November and the Centre's first ever Members' Week takes place 5th – 11th December.

NORTH BERWICK TRUST

As reported in the last newsletter applications for grants from the North Berwick Trust totalling £50k were invited from organisations in North Berwick by September 30th. 25 organisations, covering a wide spectrum of interests, submitted applications for 29 projects totalling £215k and provisional awards for sums amounting to £58k are under consideration. Awards depend on certain conditions including projects must be for, and in, North Berwick, and ready to proceed before a grant is paid. Approved grants will be required to conform to the objectives set out in the Original Trust Deed of 1974 which can be summed up as Recreation, Education, Provision of parks and gardens in North Berwick and the relief of need and suffering. The Trustees have been impressed with the quality and variety of applications received and hope to resolve very soon the situation which has now arisen with the enforced change of trustees resulting from the Community Council elections. Applicants who are deemed unsuccessful and those who did not apply will get another chance in 2017 as there are likely to be rounds of applications in the Spring and in the Autumn.

NORTH BERWICK GOLF CLUB

The North Berwick Golf Club has made the first round of awards since announcing their scheme for supporting worthy local causes. Grants totalling £8760 have been paid and 11 organisations have benefitted. Managing Secretary Chris Spencer said “we were delighted with the response to this initiative and very pleased to be able to contribute to such a wide range of local requests. COMMUNITY RAIL PARTNERSHIP



Following a successful well attended Annual General Meeting last month the committee of the Community Rail Partnership are redoubling their efforts to ensure that passenger comments are taken seriously by the proper authorities. All our stations now boast an information board featuring information about the line. An order is about to be placed for updated line guides for next year. In addition, plans are in place to develop a user friendly website. Following our success in securing an early morning train from North Berwick on Sundays we are pursuing the case for a later weekday train from the city, as well as constantly reviewing connectivity issues. At our request outline planning permission for a toilet at the station is being submitted. Watch out for Michael Portillo at the end of January when his TV program visits East Lothian.

THE COOLEST FESTIVAL UNDER THE SUN!

The 9th Fringe By The Sea took place in August and by general agreement was one of the best in the history of the event. Perhaps with an accent on performers ‘of a certain age’ – with Elkie Brooks, Paul Jones, Geno Washington and Roger McGough all well settled in their seventies – nevertheless they all provided unforgettable gigs, as did many of the more youthful artistes! A great eclectic mix of genres through the week provided something for everyone, and feedback seems to suggest that most tastes were catered for. The Outcome Report has put a figure of £1.49m as the net additional impact of event goes as a result of the Festival, translating into the sustaining of 28 tourism jobs. So a real economic benefit to North Berwick as well as being a week of fun and entertainment! Well done Eric, Jane and John and your fabulous team of volunteers.
